## Chicago Civil Rights And Social Justice Trailblazers Honored At Barnes & Thornburg's Eighth Annual Celebration Of Diversity

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**CHICAGO** – More than 300 legal and business community leaders gathered on Aug. 16 to honor the contributions of three noted Chicago diversity trailblazers at Barnes & Thornburg's eighth annual Celebration of Diversity dinner. He aims to both educate and empower students, and for the last six years under his leadership, the school has seen 100 percent college acceptance.
- The Reverend Jesse L. Jackson, Sr., founder and president of the Rainbow PUSH Coalition, is one of America's foremost civil rights, religious and political figures and a Chicago icon. He has played a pivotal role in virtually every movement for empowerment, peace, civil rights, gender equality, and economic and social justice.

In lauding the honorees, Boykin added, "Barnes &Thornburg continues to show that we are committed to not only creating a platform to have important conversations about diversity and inclusion, but also to taking
