



Reopening In Indiana—The Governor Says You'll Need A Safety Plan

On May 1, Governor Holcomb issued an executive order setting forth a schedule for a phased reopening of Indiana's economy in light of the COVID-19 pandemic. The order requires all employers wishing to continue operations or reopen to implement a safety plan by Monday, May 11. The plan must be publicly posted and provided to each employee.

The purpose of the plan is to ensure a safe environment for both employees and customers. At a minimum, the plan must address the following four points:

- 1. Instituting an employee health screening process
- 2. Employing enhanced cleaning and disinfecting protocols for the workplace, including regularly cleaning high-touch surfaces
- 3. Enhancing the ability of employees, customers, and clients to wash hands or take other personal hygiene measures such as the use of hand sanitizer
- 4. Complying with social distancing requirements established by the CDC, including maintaining six-foot social distancing for both employees and members of the public when possible and/or employing other separation measures such as wearing face coverings or using barriers
